SENTENCE COMPLETION / WORD FILLERS

Sentence Completion is a common test item in which a sentence contains one or two blanks to be filled in using the choices. These questions test your vocabulary and knowledge of the finer distinctions among words. A good vocabulary can be a great help here.

Strategies for Sentence Completion

1. Read the Sentence

Use the sentence clues by reading the sentence thoroughly. Two things make a question difficult: difficult words and sentence structure. If you cannot dissect a sentence to figure out what fits best, you cannot crack the question though you know the word's meanings. You need to take apart the sentences and improve your vocabulary.

2. Hints

The hints indicate what should go into the blank for the sentence to make sense. Here's a test to locate the right hint: if you change the hint, the choice in the blank must be changed. Often, you can use the hint by putting that word or phrase into the blank itself.

3. Positive or Negative

Once you find the word clues, indicate the kind of word you're looking for with a positive meaning or negative meaning.

4. Structure Words

Look for words like but, rather, although, however, and, while, but, and therefore.

They reveal the sentence organization and the hint-blank relationship. They tell you what kinds of words to look for as they change the thought process in the sentence.

5. Visualize

Consider the available words for the blanks before moving on to the options. It will protect you from making poor decisions. Elimination is considerably easier if you have a rough idea of the types of words required. This is preferable to testing out the options to see "what sounds good". It is more efficient and less prone to mistakes.
